Course Overview:

This course is an introduction to the study of the origins and development of human culture and the major concepts, issues, theories, and methods of cultural anthropology that guide the comparative study of sociocultural systems. Students will gain an awareness of the scope of the discipline, and the particular perspectives of anthropology that make it unique among the human sciences. In addition to the materials presented through the textbooks, we will focus on the political and cultural economy of music as a "case study" for exploring the distinctive contributions of anthropology to intellectual inquiry, to understanding human cultural diversity and our own place in the world, and to opening a lens on major issues in the social and human sciences. We will spend time each week discussing and applying the concepts from the texts and lecture to analysis of music and its forms, histories, varieties, and complex interconnections with other cultural domains.

Grading:

Students will be required to complete a series of short writing assignments for the course.

First, students must select a musical composition for analysis, and submit a 1 page (300 word minimum) discussion and justification of this musical selection (10%).

Additionally, four short papers (1200-1800 words each) are required for the course:

- A cultural analysis of Pink Floyd's The Wall (due at the start of class on Feb 24) (15%);
- A cultural analysis of a musical selection of the student's choice (due at the start of class March 31) (15%); and •
- A reaction paper based on The Spirit Catches You and You Fall Down (due at the start of class on April 14) (10%);
- Finally, students must create an original poetic or lyrical composition and cultural analysis/interpretation of it (due at the start of class 04/07) (10%). [Word count for this assignment must be between 750 – 1000 words]

The parameters and requirements for each of these papers will be given in class and available on the course web page. There will also be three examinations (10% each), and unannounced quizzes will be given as the instructor deems

necessary. Attendance will be taken each day and will affect the final grade. Perfect attendance will improve your grade by 10%, and one unexcused absence will allow for 5% to be added to your grade. Three or more unexcused absences will lower your grade one full letter grade; five or more unexcused absences will constitute a failing grade. Excused absences will not affect your grade. A table listing letter grades and their equivalent grade points appears on the final page of this syllabus. Excusable absences will be allowed pursuant to UF policy. A link to UF's absence policy can be found at the end of this syllabus. Late submissions will not be accepted.
