Introduction:

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the field of cultural anthropology, the study of contemporary human society and culture. In this course, students will learn what cultural anthropology is and what cultural anthropologists do. Also, students will be able to situate cultural anthropology within the other social sciences.

One of the key concerns in cultural anthropology is to examine human cultural variation. In the aims of answering how we, as humans, are similar and different throughout space and time, we will take a cross-cultural, anthropological perspective of several key lifespheres- race and ethnicity, gender, kinship, economies, religion, language and arts.

Components

In-class activities: Throughout the term, we will be carrying out different activities in class that you will have to turn in to me for a grade. These activities cannot be made up, unless you have a university-approved absence.

Quizzes: You will take three quizzes throughout the semester administered through e-learning. The quiz dates are on the syllabus. These are to ensure that you understand the key concepts from the readings and the material presented in class. They will be administered through the e-learning website. Unlike exams, we will have class on quiz dates. You can take the quizzes in a place and with a computer of your choice. It is your responsibility to have a reliable internet connection. The format will be multiple-choice, true-false and fill in the blank. Quizzes will cover material in the readings, lectures, guest lectures and films.

Classroom expectations and attendance policy: As college students, you are responsible for your own learning. Therefore, I will not be taking attendance in this class. However, I highly recommend that you attend class every day. We will be covering a lot of material in very little time. Also, in-class activities cannot be made up, unless you have a university approved absence. General classroom guidelines are as follows:

- Do not come to class to do homework or to sleep.
- Tardiness: Tardiness really distracts others, so be on time and only leave early if you really have to. If you arrive to class 15 minutes after we have started, I will kindly ask you to please leave the room.
- Students are expected to read material before it is covered in class.
- · Students are expected to be active participants in class.
- Students are expected to exhibit respectful behavior toward the class and toward your peers.
- Technology in the classroom: Computers may be used in class for taking notes or reviewing Power Points. Do not use computers to send emails, facebook, games or other non-class related activity. The use of cell phones, pagers, iPods or mp3 players during class is prohibited. All equipment must be turned off in the classroom. Any evidence of cell phones (use, ringing, buzzing, texting, etc.) and similar equipment use will result in me asking you to leave the classroom and getting a zero in the in-class activity of the day.

Exams: There will be a total of <u>three exams</u> in this class. They are non-cumulative and will be based on the readings and lectures. The exam format will be multiple choice, true-false and fill in the blank. Exams are not curved and no make-up tests will be given.

Exams will be administered through e-Learning on the days scheduled on this syllabus. You are not required to attend class the day of a scheduled exam. You can take the exams in a place and with a computer of your choice. It is <u>your</u> responsibility to have a reliable internet connection. Further instruction about how to complete an online exam will be provided in class.

NO DEVIATION OF THE TEST SCHEDULE WILL BE ALLOWED, UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES; this means NO early or late exams (unless you have a university approved absence).
