DEVELOPMENT OF WORLD CIVILIZATION

Course Objectives

This course exams the development of civilization in a global perspective using the archaeological record of past peoples with a focus on how and why civilizations develop and how they collapse. We begin with the origins of food production and conclude with European colonization of the Americas. We will cover the fundamentals of archaeological research. The focus is primarily non-Western civilizations. You will need to understand geography and the temporal relationships within and between cultures.
