COURSE DESCRIPTION

Course content is Prosimians, Monkeys and Apes and with emphasis on the behavioral ecology and evolution of individuals, sexes and social groups. And Humans are primates. Current ideas are that the first primates appeared ~ 80 million years ago. For more than 60 million years, humans and nonhuman primates have the shared the same primate ancestry. The last common ancestor of humans and African apes lived only about 5-8 million years ago.

Shared ancestry is a major reason why human and nonhuman primates have many characteristics in common -- tool use, long-lasting social relationships and intricate, distinctive communication systems. By learning about nonhuman primates, we may therefore come to learn more about ourselves. In effect, nonhuman primates can be transcendent, showing us both the similarities and differences of between ourselves and nonhuman primates. Exploiting nonhuman primates for novel perspectives on humans, however, requires that the course material for ANT4552 Primate Behavior also encompass behavioral sampling, the comparative method and cost-benefit analyses of behavioral strategies.

A maximum of 25 undergrads can be registered for ANT4552, section 8009, Fall Semester 2011. This course is recommended for upper division students unless a student has exceptional preparation. For ANT4552 strives to be more seminar than lecture; think intro to a full-fledged grad seminar. While a description of intriguing nonhuman primates is fine, we address the structures, mechanisms, functions, ontogeny, and evolutionary history of primate behavior.

OBJECTIVES OF ANT 4552:

- 1. To understand the basic behavioral, social and physical diversity of the Order Primates, as well as basic Primate taxonomy.
- 2. To understand that the behavioral adaptations of nonhuman primates reflect the interplay of natural and sexual selection, environment and morphology.
- 3. To understand the fundamental principles taxonomy, phylogeny and comparative biology, particularly as concerns nonhuman primates.

Textbooks, Required Readings & Other Course Resources

- ◆ Strier, K. Primate Behavior and Ecology (**PBE**), **4th** ed. W.H. Freeman & Company. Do *not* purchase either the 2nd or 3rd editions. Your instructor is not responsible for accommodating students purchasing the wrong edition.

additional educational materials via the website, for possible use in class or posting on the web site. These short texts or other media expand the textbook on issues the instructor deems important as well as underscoring the broader societal and scientific implications of primate behavioral ecology. Those students reading the short articles will profit in multiple ways. (1) The opportunity to harvest of extra credit points in exams and quizzes. (2) Glowing more brightly in class discussions.

♦ Media shown in class and available on web site reinforce formal text and lecture material. These materials also provide specific examples of concepts concerning nonhuman primates, which are required components of many exam questions

GRADING AND EXAMS

Quizzes: ∑=15%:. One scheduled quiz (5%) occurs before Exam1. After Exam1, one other quiz is scheduled (10%). Several unannounced "pop" quizzes are possible if the instructor deems useful in motivating student study. Only the highest two scores will be employed in calculating student scores. A *PRACTICE EXAM* will precede the first quiz by a week. Each student will grade their own practice quiz, which never be examined by the instructor – unless the student requests direct feedbacl.

Exams: Σ = 60%: EXAM1 (26%); EXAM2 (35%) on December 7th, last day of class. Be forewarned that by necessity some information subject to EXAM1 may be addressed again in latter parts of the seminar.

Participation: 25%: Individual participation in class, i.e., asking questions and/or providing comments. Also media and reprint submission for class use.

Attendance: Reflected in sitting exams and quizzes as scheduled and occasional attendance checks. See make-up work policy below. Students attending class sporadically rarely do well

Class Participation:

Students should be prepared to discuss the week's topic by reading the assigned

readings prior to class (See following page for assignments). Participation is expected and encouraged. In addition to the textbook, emphasize to lectures and, especially, the study guide.

Class Performance:

- **1. DO NOT**: Text on cell phone, use/answer your phone (please put on silent ring), sleep or have personal conversations unrelated to class room purposes. Although these are natural human behaviors, we would prefer for these activities to remain in the proper habitat ---outside of the classroom. Disengage completely from the web in its various incarnations unless directly salient to the course. Please make valiant efforts to maintain engagement with the class, not a social media account.
- 2. We are in the class room for an extended period. A limited number of discrete, brief departures from the lectureAt natural breaks in the class content, students will be encouraged to take a brief recess. Discrete consumptions of beverages is allowed. Please refrain from eating during class. Many individuals are unaware of the distractions they can make in the classroom.

Class Communication:

Use the SAKAI mail system for communications in preference to email. This allows the instructor to compile course material in one location. All links and attachments are best sent via the web site.
