Course summary

Have you wondered what it takes to be published in a peer-reviewed journal? Do you want to gain experience with the peer review process, invite researchers to submit articles, organize a special issue, learn about copyediting, work on social media or website design, or write your own article? In this class, you will get hands-on, behind-the-scenes experience with a peer-reviewed, open access journal, the *New Florida Journal of Anthropology (NFJA)* - https://journals.flvc.org/NFJA. *NFJA* is a graduate student-run journal that was started 1976 by PhD students in UF's Department of Anthropology. Each student in the class will design their own goals for the semester based on their research and career interests.

Course description

This course is designed to prepare graduate students to write their own peer-reviewed journal articles by giving them hands-on experience with the peer review process. Students will work on the editorial board of *NFJA* to oversee the submission and review of articles, as well as the acceptance, copy-editing, and final publication of accepted articles. Students can also participate in the publication process by writing their own article or helping organize a special issue, either on their own or in collaboration. We will also discuss ethical issues related to academic research and publishing.

Course objectives

- 1. Acquire hands-on experience with the peer-review process of academic journals
- 2. Learn how to write, submit, revise, and publish a peer-reviewed article
- 3. Understand ethical issues related to academic publishing

Course format

Course meeting times will be determined based on all students' availability. We will meet via Zoom once per week as a class (to discuss readings and updates on *NFJA* submissions) and once every one or two weeks individually (based on students' goals and progress in the class). Individual meetings will be in-person or via Zoom, based on the student's preference.

Grading

Evaluation of student performance is based on class attendance (10%), presentation of an ethical issue related to research and publication (5%), and development and completion of a project that is customized for each student (5% - detailed description of proposed project + 80% - completion of project). The publication project is intended to provide hands-on experience with publishing peer-reviewed independent research and may consist of any of the following: 1) serve as an editor for *NFJA* or another peer-reviewed journal to oversee the review and publication of submissions, organize a special issue, develop online or social media content, etc, 2) develop your own article for publication or collaborate with a colleague on an article, or 3) another project of the student's choosing to help build the student's research resume and career development.

Class Expectations

Attendance and punctuality

Students may not record audio or video of other students. Since this class is held via Zoom with substantial class participation, it will not be feasible to record class Zoom meetings.
