
ANT 2149 Lost Tribes and Sunken Continents: Pseudoarchaeology and Why It Matters Spring 2024

Description

This course examines claims, popularized in the media, that mysterious archaeological sites, statues, etc. were influenced by outer space visitors. Case studies to be discussed include Stonehenge, various pyramids, Easter Island, Atlantis and Mu, the Nazca Lines, and other archaeological "mysteries." Emphasis will be placed on understanding how and why pseudoscientific beliefs proliferate, and on understanding the real archaeological histories of ancient peoples.

Course Objectives

By the end of the course, students will:

- 1) be able to assess critically narratives about the past.
- 2) know how to analyze how the past is represented in various forms of media.
- 3) have an understanding of the use of the scientific method in archaeology.
- 4) be able to critique conspiracy theories.
- 5) identify how diverse perspectives can actually revolutionize the field of archaeology and drive the discipline forward.
