Course Objectives:

This course provides an introduction to the field of forensic anthropology. Forensic anthropology is an applied area of biological anthropology that focuses on the identification of human skeletal remains in a medicolegal context. This course will introduce you to basic terms and principles of forensic anthropology, focus on concepts and their applications, and present case histories.

This is not intended to be a “how-to” course but a general overview of the discipline. Upon completion of this course, you should be able to:

- Define the field of forensic anthropology and its purview
- Have a general understanding of basic human osteology
- Understand the basic concepts underlying determination of the biological profile, including sex, age, ancestry, and stature
- Describe different types of skeletal trauma, and differentiate between antemortem and postmortem trauma

Course Materials:

Required: Warren MW et al. 2011 Bare Bones: A Survey of Forensic Anthropology. 2nd edition. Kendall Hunt Publishing.

Additional readings will be provided by the instructor and posted on Canvas. Required readings are listed below in the course schedule. All graded assignments will only reference required materials.

Grading:

There will be three (3) exams worth 100 points each (300 pts total). The exams are not cumulative and contribute equally to your final grade. Participation will be given based on in-class quizzes and in-class activities worth 3 points each (60 pts total). The lowest 3 participation grades will be dropped. Assignments worth 15 points each will be due via Canvas (90 pts total). A final paper will be worth 50 points. If you would like to contest a grade, you must do so within one week of that grade being posted. After that time, all grades are final. Final grades will be calculated as a percentage of the total available points (500) and graded using the following scale:

Exams: Exams are open-note, and to be taken on the scheduled day via Canvas. The exam will be available for the entire day and must be completed before 11:59PM EST. Students will have 2 hours (the equivalent of the Tuesday class period) to complete their exam. Each exam is worth 100 points, consisting of a combination of matching, true/false, multiple choice, and short answer questions. Potential exam material includes information covered in lectures, the textbook, videos shown in-class, and guest speakers. Study guides detailing the content for upcoming exams will be provided two weeks before the exam. If any accommodations are necessary, please reach out at least 1 week before the exam.

Assignments: Six short assignments will be due by 11:59PM EST on days indicated on the Reading Schedule. Each assignment is worth 15 points. All assignments should be turned in via Canvas. The assignments vary and include activities such as interpreting a field map and discussions of the reading that was assigned to be completed on or before that day. All instructions for the assignments will be clearly stated in the assignment page on Canvas. If there is an error with submitting to Canvas, students should email the assignment to the instructor or grader before the deadline.

Class Participation and Quizzes: In-class quizzes or activities will occur throughout the semester, and will not be advertised beforehand. Some of these will be in class activities while others will be written in-class quizzes. Students must be present in class to receive credit for these in-class quizzes or activities. Students will receive zero points if their answer is illegible to the grader and/or their name is not present. The lowest 3 (three) quizzes/activities will be dropped.

Final Paper: Students must write a 5-8 page literature review of a topic related to this forensic anthropology. Topics need to be approved by the instructor via Canvas no later than March 1st, 2024. The paper must be font size 12 Times New Roman, double spaced, and 1-inch margins. A minimum of 7 recent (i.e., within the last 5 years) primary research articles that will inform you about a research question are required. You must integrate these articles (e.g. compare and contrast their findings) to lead you to a tentative conclusion on the topic. You should include articles that provide different viewpoints on the topic if possible. This document is due on Canvas no later than April 27th, 2024 at 11:59 pm EST. This is worth up to fifty (50) points. See Canvas for rubric and instructional pdf for additional details.

Extra Credit: One extra credit opportunity is available. Students are to watch a film or episode of television that includes forensic science or anthropology. A list of recommended media will be provided, but students are welcome to put forward their own suggestions for instructor approval. The assignment is a paper, guided by questions provided by the instructor about the techniques used in the media, comparing and contrasting them to what they have learned in class, and more. The paper must be font size 12 Times New Roman, single spaced, 1-inch margin, and no longer than 2 pages. The assignment is worth up to 2 additional points added to your final grade in the course. All papers should be submitted via Canvas no later than April 27th, 2024, at 11:59pm EST. File formats that cannot be viewed by the instructor will not receive credit.

****The use of ChatGPT or any other AI program to generate student work is not allowed in this course.****
