Course Objectives: This course provides an introduction to the field of forensic anthropology. Forensic anthropology is an applied area of biological anthropology that focuses on the identification of human skeletal remains in a medicolegal context. This course will introduce you to basic terms and principles of forensic anthropology, focus on concepts and their applications, and present case histories. This is not intended to be a "how-to" course but a general overview of the discipline. Upon completion of this course, you should be able to:

- Define the field of forensic anthropology and its purview
- Have a general understanding of human osteology
- Understand the basic concepts underlying determination of the biological profile, including sex, age, ancestry, and stature
- Describe different types of skeletal trauma, and differentiate between antemortem and postmortem trauma

Some lectures will include disturbing and graphic images. Please consider your reaction to this material before taking this course. You will be responsible for all course material.

Note that the format of the make-up assignment(s) and exam(s) may differ from that of regularly scheduled assignments and exams (e.g., primarily composed of essay questions). Documentation for late or missed work, including exams, should be provided within 48 hours of the excused period of absence.

Grading: There will be three (3) in-class exams worth 100 points each (300pts total). These exams are not cumulative and contribute equally to your final grade. Five in-class discussions based on assigned readings are worth 20 points each (100pts total). A group project based on a case history is worth 100 points. Final grades will be calculated as a percentage of the total available points (500pts).

Exams: Exams are to be taken on the scheduled day (see below). Each exam is worth 100 points. Exams may include a combination of multiple choice, fill in the blank, labeling, true/false, and short answer. Exam material includes lectures, the textbook, videos shown in-class, and guest speakers.

In-class Discussions: In-class discussions based on assigned readings will occur according to the schedule below. During specified class times, the instructor will provide 1-3 questions during class which students will first individually answer on Canvas discussion boards. Paper submissions will be accepted in cases of technical issues only if they are turned into the instructor immediately by the student themselves and have the student's name. Next, students will discuss the questions in small groups chosen randomly and assigned by the instructor. Finally, we will discuss the questions as a class.

Group Project – Case Histories: Students will work in groups assigned randomly by the instructor to present a case history to the class. Topics and group member roles should be submitted to the instructor for approval by the date noted in the schedule below. As part of this assignment, students will individually submit team, peer, and self-evaluations to the instructor. PowerPoint presentations must not exceed the time limit discussed in class, involve all group members, and include:

- a summary of the case
- highlights of forensic techniques/methods
- critiques in the literature, news, social media of the techniques/methods
- your assessment of the techniques/methods
- images/graphs/diagrams to clarify the case, critiques, assessment
- References Cited
- 2 discussion questions for the class based on the case

Canvas Discussion Boards: The instructor will occasionally monitor student discussion boards on Canvas for topics such as forensic training (a running list of graduate programs, professional programs, short courses, field schools), jobs, Twitter/social media/outreach, and general questions. The purpose of these boards is to spread the word about forensic programs and topics that may be of interest to the class. These discussions will not contribute to the overall grade.
