The laboratory sessions are designed to provide students with experience in analyzing archaeological materials. This allows students to incorporate what they learn during class lectures, along with textbook materials, into a hands-on experience with laboratory methods and archaeological interpretation. In addition to hands-on activities the laboratory sessions provide a forum for class discussions that build upon and clarify concepts introduced during lecture sessions. Finally, these sessions provide exam reviews. These sections account for a portion of students' participation and attendance grade.

LABORATORY OBJECTIVES:

To provide students with the opportunity to apply concepts learned through readings and lectures to the analysis of actual archaeological materials. By the end of the semester students should have a fundamental understanding of how archaeologists conduct lithic analysis, ceramic analysis, and zooarchaeological analysis to interpret the materials recovered from sites. Additionally, students should understand how spatial technologies are incorporated into archaeological research and the different techniques used to date archaeological materials.

LABORATORY SECTION EXPECTATIONS:

Laboratory sessions constitute 20% of students' final grade for the course. As such, attendance and participation are mandatory. You are allowed one unexcused absence without penalty. Subsequent unexcused absences will result in a reduction of your final grade for each additional unexcused absence from the lab. Involuntary absences in cases of certifiable/documented emergencies will be excused. Attendance will be taken for each lab session.
