Course Description

This course provides an overview on the diversity of sex and gender roles in a variety of cultural, economic, religious, political, and social spheres. These ideological roles are socially constructed, continuously evolving, are present in both historical and modern contexts, and are essential to the understanding of global cultures.

Through the assigned readings, writing assignments, in-class films and class lectures, students will learn how various sexual identities and gender ideologies are constructed in socio-cultural domains across the world. Students will also be introduced to ethnographic case studies to understand the parallels and divergences of sex and gender roles found in a variety of cultures.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students will:

- Survey, compare, and assess a wide range of cultural perspectives on sex and gender ideologies
- Produce weekly assessments that indicate the student's reflexivity and awareness of their own cultural norms and biases to understand the gender roles and ideologies within their own society
- Develop an understanding of the political and social implications of gender ideologies
- Gain competence in the terminology, concepts, theories, and methodologies used in gender research
- Examine, discuss, and compare a variety of classic and contemporary gender research in the discipline of Anthropology
- Articulate the knowledge they've acquired to formulate their own critical reasoning and ideas clearly and effectively through their writing and discussion
- Incorporate the assigned readings into the in-class activities, class discussions, and assigned papers, demonstrating their understanding and analytical thinking of the intersection of key topics and themes

Course Expectations

Students will be required to attend class, prepare for class lectures by completing the assigned readings, take attentive notes during lectures, participate in in-class activities and class discussions, complete the assigned reading and writing assignments, and complete the examinations. The Sakai website will be utilized to provide additional assigned readings to the students, to share other links and educational materials with the class, and to provide a contact interface between the students and the instructor. Cell phones must be OFF or on silent.

This syllabus is a guide for the semester's activities and assignments, but the Instructor reserves the right to make changes to the structure of the course or course materials at any time. If such changes are made, students will be notified of what those changes are both in class and via an announcement on Sakai.

Assignments

Make-ups will not be allowed without a legitimate, documented excuse (such as a medical excuse). If a student is aware ahead of time that they will be unable to take a quiz, exam, or turn in a paper on the due date, they can notify the Instructor to arrange a make-up date if they give at **least 2 weeks** notice. Otherwise, a make-up can only be given in the student has an acceptable documented excuse.

Weekly Assessments: These assessments will be completed through Sakai, and will include reaction statements regarding the readings or the films. Students are expected to have prepared for these assessments by: having done the readings and having paid attention to the lectures and films in class, taking notes, jotting down questions for discussion in class, and noting their reactions to the films and readings. The Instructor will provide further instructions on the assessments in class.

Papers: There will be 2 assigned papers. Paper topics will be discussed in class. Papers (printed) will be due in class on the date stated in the class schedule listed in this syllabus. All papers must be a minimum of 4 pages, not including the works cited page. Papers must use Times New Roman, 12 pt font, 1" margins, and double spaced. The works cited must include at least 3 academic citations (additional non-academic sources can be included). For quotations and citations, use Chicago Style Guide, MLA, or another common format.

Exams: There are 2 non-cumulative exams: a midterm and a final. The mid-term will be given during a class period. The final will be given during finals see. See the schedule for the exam dates. Students need to only bring a pen or pencil (no scantrons required).
