You might also benefit from anatomy coloring books or other anatomy books. The required textbook provides some of the evolutionary context for the structures we see in the human body, however, students often find a basic anatomy book useful for identifying structures.

Course Description:

Survey of human anatomy from evolutionary and embryological perspectives. The phylogenetic and functional basis for human form. Anatomical principles underlying developmental and functional disorders are explored through clinical and comparative examples.

Course Objectives:

1) Survey regional and systemic human anatomy

- 2) Explore the embryological and historical basis for human structure
- 3) Evaluate the evolutionary significance of anatomical relationships and variations.

In this course, you will learn how to use the facts of anatomy to understand human adaptation as well as how evolutionary and developmental processes have shaped the human body.

Assessments and Grading:

Grades are determined based on student performance on quizzes (n=9), activities (n=9), discussions (n=9), and one final exam (n=1).

This course consists of 9 modules over the course of 15 weeks. Students are responsible for watching lectures available on Canvas and complete the required readings before beginning assignments for the module.

Each module contains one quiz, one discussion, and one activity. Online quizzes will consist of 20 questions for a total of 20 points, and are closed book. Activities are each worth 15 points (except for Activity 1), and will be a mix of identification, matching, and/or short answer exercises. Discussion posts will be worth 10 points each and require students to provide their own original, substantive post, as well as responses to two other students. Please see each discussion prompt on Canvas for details regarding word count and content. The final exam will be cumulative and administered during finals week and will be worth 100 points. Specific due dates for each Module can be found at the end of the syllabus. Assignments are typically due at 11:59pm.
