Course Overview

This course will review the subfield of bioarchaeology in considerable detail. Such a subject of study is indeed diverse, but concerns mainly the analysis of human remains in archaeological context. Basic biological anthropology principles should be already well established and each student should have a working knowledge of human osteology and archaeology. We will begin with the history of biological anthropology and frame the role of bioarchaeology within current lines of inquiry in anthropology, more generally. We will also explore the development of method and theory in bioarchaeology, using the rather dated Larsen book as one guide, but fetching articles from peer-reviewed journals as a supplement to update the Larsen text, and provide for a more rounded discussion of the field as it is practiced in the present day. This is a seminar course, and all readings assigned should be read prior to the class that they are scheduled. There will also be two explicit assignments and six weeks (*) where article summaries are required (details to be discussed)

Course content (lectures, assigned reading, discussion, two assignments, article summaries) will be evaluated through two On-Line Exams, and a cumulative Final Exam (500 points total).
