Course Objective:

What is lithic technology? How does understanding the way that lithics were made enable us to reconstruct past societies? This course will introduce the students to the diversity of Prehistoric artifacts and to the different existing methods of analysis. Lectures on general aspects and case studies will alternate with sessions of experimental knapping. Students will also work with collections and learn how to identify, sort and analyze artifacts.
