Introduction

How do humans understand and shape the natural environment? How does the natural environment influence culture and society? Anthropologists have long been interested in these questions, and the theoretical perspectives for understanding human-environment interactions have been diverse and dynamic through time. This class will explore historical and current approaches for examining how humans perceive and interact with the world in which they live, and how culture shapes behaviors, beliefs and values that influence processes of environmental transformation.

Learning Objectives

- Assess historical and current theoretical approaches to understanding human-environment interactions.
- Examine key concepts and current challenges for human-environment interactions and change processes.
- Explore how western and nonwestern cultures vary in their understandings of the natural world and the implications for local and global environmental transformations.
- Consider human behavior and globalization, and how human behavior can exacerbate or mitigate environmental degradation.
- Evaluate approaches and opportunities for moving toward a sustainable global social- ecological system.

Required Textbook

This course will have a Canvas page (<u>http://elearning.ufl.edu/</u>). All assignments should be submitted via Canvas unless otherwise noted. Students will be responsible for checking the Canvas page for course announcements, assignment details, and updates to their grades.

Course Format

The course follows a team-based learning method to facilitate close reading of course materials and stimulate discussion. Students will be divided into groups on the first day of class, and will remain in the same groups throughout the semester. Students will take weekly individual and team quizzes, complete in-class assignments, write a reflective journal that will be shared via Canvas and engage with course material in teams. Fridays are generally reserved for audiovisual material.

*Note: The COVID-19 outbreak has forced this course to move from its original brick-and-mortar format to an online format. I therefore reserve the right to alter the course format if it becomes clear that the learning objectives are not being met.

Expectations

- I expect you to attend class, unless you have a compelling and verifiable excuse for your absence.
- I expect you to complete assigned readings **before** lecture. Reading ahead of time facilitates assimilation of course material and allows me to address your questions as they arise. *Students who do not do the reading should not expect a good grade in the course.*
- I expect you to participate fully in class discussion. (This also requires that you have done the reading.) Discussions are intended to help students assimilate course material, apply anthropological concepts, and to learn to develop arguments using evidence from texts and lecture.
- I expect you to complete all assignments on time. Assignments submitted after the deadline will be docked one letter grade per DAY that they are overdue.
- I expect you to communicate respectfully with your instructor, and classmates. This includes listening (or reading) intently and offering thoughtful, facilitative responses to your classmates' comments.
- I expect you to complete course evaluations at the end of the semester to help improve the course for future students and provide valuable feedback to your instructor.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS (Additional detailed directions to follow on Canvas.)

Weekly Individual Quizzes (5 @ 10 pts ea = 50 pts)

Completed **before** class. Weekly individual quizzes will be administered on Canvas to maintain accountability and test initial understanding of that week's materials.

Weekly Team Quizzes (5 @ 10 pts ea = 50 pts)

Completed **during** class. These quizzes will combine questions from the two previous online quizzes and are intended to allow teammates to discuss wrong answers and clarify misunderstandings.

Weekly Team Engagement Activities (5 @ 20 pts ea = 100 pts)

Completed **during** class. Teams will engage in activities during class (debates, simulations, etc.) that are intended to stimulate thoughtful, creative interaction with the course material.

Reflective Journal (80 pts) + Discussion Boards (4 @ 20 pts ea = 80 pts)

These will be graded on **content** and **completion**. The contents of your reflective journal are your "fieldnotes" of your time taking this course.

You will **share one** reflective journal entry **(20 points)** and **respond** to **at least one** of your peer's entries **(20 points) every Thursday** on Canvas. I am flexible on the format—you may share a video, audio recording, poetry, sketch/drawing, photograph, etc. If you choose to be more creative, a written explanation will be required to show that you have engaged with the required readings and additional materials from that week. Please be thoughtful and polite. A rubric will be posted on Canvas.

You will submit your reflective journal at the end of this course, so please keep up with it (80 pts). Reflective journal due by Friday, June 19 at 11:59pm

Final Project Pitch (20 pts)

Due by Tuesday, May 19 at 11:59pm

You are required to submit a short paragraph (200-300 words) pitching your idea for a final project (see final project options below). This assignment is intended to get you thinking about your final project early on. You will receive feedback so that you can implement changes and move forward with your final project.

Final Project Outline and Bibliography (40 pts)

Due by Monday, June 1 at 9:00am

The final project outline is a short (500-600 word) overview of your final project that concisely outlines the logical flow of your project as a whole.

The bibliography includes 7-10 relevant and well-thought out references and includes a brief sentence for each reference explaining how it relates to your paper topic.

Final Project (180 pts)

Due by Thursday, June 18 at 11:59pm

For your final project, you can choose to write a final paper on a topic of your choice. The paper is expected to be between 10-12 pages (about 2500-3000 words total, not including references). *Format: MS Word (.doc or .docx), Times New Roman, 12-point font, double-spaced, 1-inch margins.*

Besides the format of a final paper, alternate formats that incorporate features such as ethnographic writing, video and/or audio elements, poetry, storytelling, music, or other artistic expression are possible for the final project but **must be approved by the instructor through the final project pitch**. If you choose to be more creative, you will be expected to include a critical reflection component that addresses the following:

- (1) the main point about the environment and culture that you want to convey,
- (2) how course material(s) were and additional sources (listed in the bibliography) were inspirational in the creation of your project, and
- (3) how this exercise and class changed your perspective on the environment and culture.

Peer Evaluations (Midterm 50 pts + Final 50 pts = 100 pts)

Midterm peer evaluation due by Friday, May 29 at 11:59pm

Final peer evaluation due by Friday, June 19 at 11:59pm

Students will complete two peer evaluations for each of their teammates. The first will be assigned midterm to allow students to get feedback from their teams and assess their standing. Both the midterm and final peer evaluation will be graded for completion and based on teammate feedback. You will be evaluating each member on his or her participation in team activities. (Did they participate regularly? Were they prepared for the day's activity? Did they contribute productively to the team? Respect others' ideas?) This is to hold students accountable to their teams, to ensure that the workload is distributed evenly, and that all students are participating fully and effectively.

Late Work

Unexcused late work will drop one letter grade per day. After one week, work is only eligible for half credit. NO EXCEPTIONS.
