Dear Anthropology Graduate Students,

The Department of Anthropology Is pleased to announce the annual competition for several endowed research funds administered by the department. These awards sponsor various aspects of graduate research and dissertation preparation. The awards honor founding members of the department and other Friends of Anthropology and reflect the generous support of donors. At the bottom of this list, you will find the application cover sheet which Is used by all of the awards. Each award has other application materials as well so please-review this document-carefully.

Please Note:

1.) Only graduate students in the Department of Anthropology are eligible for these awards.

2.) All applications must include a short letter from the supervisory committee chair of the student which expresses the importance of the award towards completion of either the M.A. or Ph.D. degree.

3.) All application packages must include evidence that Institutional Review Board clearance has been initiated, received, or exempted (as appropriate).

4.) All applications packages must include evidence of in-country affiliation and/or any necessary research permits.

5.) All graduate students conducting research outside the US are required to have Medical Evacuation insurance; this cost can be included in your budget submission.

Applications are due by 4 P.M. on Wednesday, March 23, 2016 and should be delivered to Juanita Bagnali in the Graduate Program Office, 1115 Turlington Hall. <u>Late or incomplete applications will not be accepted.</u> A committee of anthropology faculty members will rank applicants and make recommendations for funding.

Criteria for review: All proposals will be reviewed by a committee of faculty members in the Department of Anthropology. Proposals will be judged on: 1) quality of the research proposal; 2) applicant's record and preparation; and 3) relationship of proposed research to degree progress.

Please note that it is the intention of the Department of Anthropology to assist as many eligible students as possible with the awards below. If you receive funding from another source for the same research project, you are required to notify the Department. The Department reserves the right to adjust funding awards based on receipt of matching funds.

Awards will be announced in mid-April. <u>All funds must be expended by April 1 of the following year.</u>

2016 AMAYA BURNS AWARD IN HONOR OF MIGUEL ANGEL AMAYA

Applications are now being accepted for the 2016 Amaya Burns Awards.

The Department of Anthropology, through a gift of Dr. Alba Amaya Burns and Dr. Allan Burns, is pleased to announce that an award of up to \$700 is available for summer research to Latin America for projects in Medical Anthropology, Human Rights, and Applied Anthropology. The award honors the memory and goals of social justice of Miguel Angel Amaya, a medical student who perished during the Civil War in El Salvador. Miguel Angel Amaya was the brother of Professor Alba Amaya Burns.

The award can be used for MA or Ph.D. research or pre-dissertation travel. The awards are for *reimbursable* expenses only. Previous recipients of the Amaya Burns Award are <u>not</u> eligible for a second award.

Applicants for the award should submit:

- 1. The attached cover sheet.
- 2. A two-page description of their research.
- 3. A budget justification for the funds.
- 4. A 150-word summary for donors telling what research will be conducted, where, and the relevance/importance of the research.
- 5. A letter of support from their supervisory committee chair attesting to the relevance of the research towards a thesis or dissertation.

2016 POLLY AND PAUL DOUGHTY RESEARCH AWARDS FOR GRADUATE ANTHROPOLOGY RESEARCH

Proposals are invited for the 2016 Polly and Paul Doughty Research Awards for graduate student of international conflict anthropological research in the area peace. resolution. development, with preference given to a focus on Latin America. These competitive awards are open to graduate students at the MA or Ph.D. level in Anthropology working in any subfield. Applicants are expected to show how their research is relevant to broad issues of international peace, conflict resolution, or development, whether in contemporary times or through history and prehistory. Multiple awards are expected to be given. Eligible students are encouraged to seek supplementary funding from other sources. Previous recipients of a Doughty Award are not eligible. The award is for reimbursable expenses. The complete application packet must include:

- 1. The attached cover sheet.
- 2. A Narrative Proposal (not to exceed 2 double-spaced pages) detailing the:
 - a. research objectives, design, and methods (with references to relevant literature).
 - b. explanation of relevance to international peace, conflict resolution, or development.

- c. indication of the relationship of the research to academic progress and career goals.
- d. language competency to carry out the proposed research (speaking and writing abilities).
- 3. A one-page budget (max. \$2000) with justification and explanation of expenses and itinerary.
- 4. A copy of current UF graduate transcript (unofficial transcript is sufficient).
- 5. A 150-word summary for donors telling what research will be conducted, where, and the relevance/importance of the research.
- 6. A letter of support from their supervisory committee chair attesting to the relevance of the research towards a thesis or dissertation.

2016 CHARLES H. FAIRBANKS AWARD

Applications are now being accepted for 2016 Charles H. Fairbanks Awards.

Multiple awards of up to \$1500 each will be made to doctoral candidates specializing in archaeology who will use the stipend for expenses related to preparation of the dissertation (e.g., photography, copying, illustrations, cartography, some final analysis, etc.). NOTE: Only students graduating within the next year are eligible to apply. Previous recipients of a Fairbanks Award are <u>not</u> eligible. The awards are for *reimbursable* expenses only.

The application should consist of

- 1. The attached cover sheet.
- 2. A two-page maximum double-spaced narrative consisting of
 - a. a brief summary of the dissertation topic
 - b. a statement of progress (including date doctoral exams were passed)
 - c. date of anticipated defense
 - d. budget
 - e. name of the graduate supervisory committee chair.
- 3. A 150-word summary for donors telling what research will be conducted, where, and the relevance/importance of the research.
- 4. A letter of support from their supervisory committee chair attesting to the relevance of the research towards a thesis or dissertation.

2016 JOHN M. GOGGIN AWARD

Applications are now being accepted for 2016 John M. Goggin Awards.

Multiple awards of up to \$1500 each will be made to doctoral candidates who will use the stipend for expenses related to doctoral research and/or preparation of the dissertation (e.g., photography, copying, illustrations, cartography, transcription, travel, field supplies, etc.). The awards are for reimbursable expenses only. Previous recipients of a Goggin Award are not eligible.

Doctoral candidates specializing in forensic anthropology should apply for the Maples Award; likewise doctoral candidates in archaeology preparing to graduate within the year are expected to apply for the Fairbanks Award.

The application should consist of

- 1. The attached cover sheet.
- 2. A two-page maximum double-spaced narrative consisting of
 - a. a brief summary of the dissertation topic
 - b. a statement of progress (including date doctoral exams were passed)
 - c. date of anticipated defense
 - d. budget
 - e. name of the graduate supervisory committee chair.
- 3. A 150-word summary for donors telling what research will be conducted, where, and the relevance/importance of the research.
- 4. A letter of support from their supervisory committee chair attesting to the relevance of the research towards a thesis or dissertation.

2016 WILLIAM R. MAPLES AWARD

Applications are now being accepted for 2016 William R. Maples Awards.

Funds are available for Anthropology graduate students conducting pre-dissertation or dissertation research in forensic anthropology. Excellence in research design and potential for significant contribution to the field of forensic anthropology are essential criteria for a successful application.

At the committee's discretion, awards will not be made if no applications meet the criteria. The awards are for *reimbursable* expenses only. Previous recipients of a Maples Award are <u>not</u> eligible.

The application should consist of

- 1. The attached cover sheet.
- 2. A two-page maximum double-spaced narrative consisting of

- a. a background statement
- b. proposed research
- c. budget (maximum \$2000)
- d. name of the graduate supervisory committee chair.
- 3. A copy of current UF graduate transcript (unofficial transcript is sufficient).
- 4. A 150-word summary for donors telling what research will be conducted, where, and the relevance/importance of the research.
- 5. A letter of support from their supervisory committee chair attesting to the relevance of the research towards a thesis or dissertation.

2016 JAMES C. WAGGONER JR. GRANTS-IN-AID

Applications are now being accepted for the 2016 James C. Waggoner Jr. Grant-in-Aid.

The Department of Anthropology is pleased to announce an award for MA or Ph.D. research for students at the University of Florida Department of Anthropology. The award honors the memory of Dr. James C. Waggoner, Jr. who had appreciation and love for the graduate program and for the value of funded research during a graduate career. Although Dr. Waggoner studied archaeology, his wishes were for the award to fund students in any subfield of anthropology.

The award can be used for MA or Ph.D. research or pre-dissertation travel. The award of up to \$800 is for *reimbursable* expenses only. Previous recipients of a Waggoner Grant-in-Aid are <u>not</u> eligible.

The application should consist of

- 1. The attached cover sheet.
- 2. A two-page maximum double-spaced narrative consisting of
 - a. description of the research
 - b. a budget justification for the funds
- 3. A 150-word summary for donors telling what research will be conducted, where, and the relevance/importance of the research.
- 4. A letter of support from their supervisory committee chair attesting to the relevance of the research towards a thesis or dissertation.
