## COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES:

The course surveys the development of the beliefs of the Jewish religion. What do Jews believe as Jews and how have these beliefs evolved and manifest over their three thousand plus year existence? The course explores Jewish beliefs in God and the Divine, in Apocalypticism and Messianism, in Jewish Exile and Return, in Penitence. These beliefs will frequently bring great disasters upon the Jewish community such as failed rebellions against the Roman Empire and the failed Messiahship of Sabbatai Sevi. However, these beliefs will also preserve the Jews for thousands of years in an often hostile world. Over the course, the class reads Gershom Scholem's classic biography of Sabbatai Sevi. The assigned readings in Scholem's book do not correspond with the subject of the class lectures.

At the end of this course, students will have: A comprehensive instruction in Jewish beliefs Read a long and major historical work Improved writing and historical analysis

## **OBSERVANCE OF RELIGIOUS HOLIDAYS:**
