Course Description:

This is a course to introduce you to archaeology and some of the major topics in the discipline using examples from around the world. We begin the course by briefly covering the history and fundamentals of the discipline. We then venture into the world of the archaeologist—what questions they ask about the past and how they go about answering them. From there, we cover cultural and technological developments that shaped the course of history: tool use, agriculture, monumental architecture, writing systems, religion, warfare, and urbanization. In doing so we will explore some of the most fascinating archaeological sites from around the world!

Student Learning Objectives:

In taking this course, you will begin to:

- 1. Recognize the diversity of archaeological sites, the people that made them and the diversity of material culture they created, from across the globe;
- 2. Identify the major shifts in culture and technology in our past that have influenced who we are and how we live today;
- 3. Discuss how archaeological approaches to studying the human past are important to understanding the present and future;
- 4. Gain an appreciation for the discipline of archaeology and the details of human cultures past and present it helps to unearth.

Text:

There is no require textbook for this course. All readings will be posted on Canvas.

Course Format

This is an online course consisting of twelve (12) modules, which corresponds to two modules per week. Each module covers a specific topic and has a range of content and activities associated with that topic. Unless otherwise noted, each week's modules and their associated assessments will open on Monday morning at 12:00 am (i.e., Sunday at midnight), and close at 11:59 pm on the due date. Please be mindful that this course is only six weeks long, and therefore moves at a quick pace. Most weeks have assignments due almost every day. Be sure to note the due dates for each assignment which are posted on Canvas as well as at the end of this document. Work must be turned in on time, and late work will only be graded in special circumstances on a case by case basis following the university's guidelines.

Every Monday morning, an email will be sent to let you know what is coming up and things that you should pay attention to and expect. Ultimately, you are responsible for knowing what is required and to prepare for it. This syllabus is the best source of information regarding the particulars of this class, so keep it handy!

Quizzes:

Each week there will be two short quizzes, one associated with each module. They consist of 10 multiple choice questions drawn from a pool of questions and are worth one point each (12 quizzes x 10 points each =120 possible points). Once the quiz is open will have 10 minutes to complete it. This means you have only one chance, so make sure you have covered the necessary material before starting and you are on a reliable internet connection. If you encounter a problem and are prematurely disconnected from your quiz, email the instructor or TA and we will work with you.

Discussions:

In addition to weekly quizzes, you will participate in an online Discussion Board each week. These interactions also make up a significant portion of your grade (6 discussion board posts x 10 points each = 60 possible points). Each week will consist be different activities based upon the modules and their subjects. You are expected to post initial discussion responses and respond to two other students' posts by the due dates listed. You can earn up to 10 points for each Discussion: 6 points for doing the post and responses completely and on time, 2 points for the relevancy of your posts and responses, and 2 points for your interactions with other students. Each discussion post will have its own requirements and tasks, and you will be graded on your participation (your initial post and your responses), the relevance of your posts (whether you met the criteria and stayed on topic), and the way you interact with others (did not harass, troll, or attack anyone).

Archaeology in the News:

These assignments are intended to reinforce the idea that the past is produced in the present and that archaeology has much to offer our lives today and in the future. One of the main avenues by which archaeological research is communicated to the public is through popular media. However, the authors of web, newspaper, and magazine articles write from their own perspectives to interpret what they see and hear about, and it is these *interpretations* that are brought to the general public through mass media outlets. Sometimes this is for the better (getting information out is good!), and sometimes it is for the worse (when misinformation is portrayed as 'truth' or 'fact'). For this assignment you are required to find a news article related to archaeology and write a ~500-word response summarizing the article, addressing how the article contributes to the general public's understanding of archaeology, and how the article conveys the relevance of archaeology in today's world. You will find more detailed instructions for these assignments posted on Canvas. You will complete this assignment twice throughout the course, and each is worth 10 points (2 archaeology in the news assignments x 10 pts = 20 possible points).

Exams:

There will be no exams for this course.

Grading:

The above assessments are worth a maximum of 200 points. Your grade will be calculated by dividing the number of points you have earned by the total maximum available points. Letter grades will be assigned based on the percentages in the Grades Breakdown section. Grades will be rounded to the nearest whole number.

Grades will be posted for assessments within seven days of the completion of the module. All grades are final seven days after posting.
