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Course Objectives:

This course provides an introduction to the field of forensic anthropology. Forensic anthropology is an applied area of biological anthropology that focuses on the identification of human skeletal remains in a medicolegal context. This course will introduce you to basic terms and principles of forensic anthropology, focus on concepts and their applications, and present case histories. This is not intended to be a "how-to" course but a general overview of the discipline. Upon completion of this course, you should be able to:

- Define the field of forensic anthropology and its purview
- Have a general understanding of human osteology
- Understand the basic concepts underlying determination of the biological profile, including sex, age, ancestry, and stature
- Describe different types of skeletal trauma, and differentiate between antemortem and postmortem trauma
- ***Some lectures will include disturbing and graphic images. Consider your reaction to this material before taking this course. You will be responsible for all course material.***

Course Mechanics:

Because this is an online class, students are expected to be self-motivated. During the fifteen week period the class is in session there will be sixteen modules with one a week, with the exception of week one. All assignments for the modules must be completed during the five day period they are assigned and will be due in full each Friday at 11:59p.m. EST. **DON'T wait till the last minute to complete the assignments.**

The instructions and materials needed for each assignment can be found under the relevant module. Please make sure you read the syllabus and familiarize yourself with Canvas. Students are responsible for all the material in each module and need to view all links posted on the course's website (e.g., lecture videos, films, articles). All of the material is fair game when it comes to quizzes, discussions and activities.

Final grades will be calculated as a percentage of the total available points as follows:

Assignments:

Assignments must be turned in by **11:59 p.m. EST on Fridays** for full credit. All assignment due dates are available both in this syllabus and on canvas.

There is one quiz for each of the sixteen modules, plus a syllabus quiz. Each module quiz is multiple choice and worth 10 points while the syllabus quiz is worth 20 points (T = 180 pts). The quizzes make up 45% of your grade.

Students will also need to complete fourteen online activities. This averages about one a week. The activities range from 5 to 10 points and are approximately 30% of the total grade (T = 120 pts).

There will be 6 discussion topics throughout the semester. Student must post a substantive original comment, worth 4 points, to the discussion by **Wednesday at 11:59 p.m.** They must then make two substantive responses, worth 3 points each, to other individual's comments by **Friday at 11:59 p.m.**. Participation in these discussions is approximately **15%** of the final grade (T = 60 pts).

There will be a five page final paper where each student will synthesize three areas of Forensic Anthropology. The paper is worth 40 points and is **10%** of the final grade. Additional instructions will be provided on Canvas.

There may be opportunities for extra credit at the discretion of the instructor.

Online Attendance and Late Policy:

For the discussion topics, the original Discussion post is due by Wednesday at 11:59 p.m. EST. Two points will be deducted if a post is late, and another two points if it is over 24 hours late. All other assignments for a given week must be submitted by the Friday deadline. No partial credit will be given for late quizzes, activities, or papers unless the student has an excused absence. Only students with DOCUMENTED excused absences may turn in work after the Friday deadline, including quizzes, discussions and activities. Students must notify the instructor at least 48 hours before the absence if possible.

If you are absent for a non-disability related reason and are unable to notify the instructor before the absence, you must provide the instructor with the necessary paperwork to have it excused within two weeks of your return to class. If an absence is unexcused you may not make up the work for any assignments missed.
