The Timucua language

Course objectives

This course is an introduction to research on Timucua, the language of the indigenous people of North Florida and adjacent parts of South Georgia. We will examine original documents in the language, and students will learn how to read Timucua material with the aid of a lexical and textual database of the language.

Grading and Requirements

10 Weekly assignments 40% 2 presentations 20% FAS abstract 5% Final paper 20% Attendance and participation 15%

Weekly assignments are based on the class list of questions and tasks (maintained as Google Spreadsheet). Every student should contribute at least one question/task per week, and every student should choose one or more questions/tasks to complete for their weekly assignment. Weekly assignments must be uploaded to Google Docs by the beginning of class on each Tuesday (e.g. Jan 12, 19, etc.).

Presentations are on a topic related to the Timucua language, chosen by you. You must submit a few paragraphs describing your research topic by Feb 2 and have it approved by me.

You will make two presentations that describe your progress on your topic. The first is the week of Mar 8-10. The second presentation is in the last two weeks of class.

Florida Anthropology Society abstract All students in the class need to write an abstract of their final research paper in a format suitable for submission to the Florida Anthropological Society. The abstract is due to me on March 8. (You do not actually have to submit the abstract to the conference.)

Final paper Students should submit a 15-20 page final paper on an approved research topic. Normally this should be on the same topic as your presentations, but you may switch topics with my approval.

Attendance and participation This course is about learning to do collaborative research in a group, discussing your ideas and questions, and contributing constructive criticism of ideas about analysis. There is no way to successfully complete the course without regular attendance and participation.
