Class Objectives:

This class examines the history and purpose of anthropological museums as institutions that preserve, display, and interpret cultural materials and humankind. We examine how museums developed, the role of exhibits and collections, and the changing social role of museums in modern culture. We also consider how to interpret human subjects and cultures in museum settings.

Various aspects of museum practice, management, and organization are addressed. We consider display of objects, interpretation and exhibit preparation, and various legal aspects of museum practice. Course materials and lectures prepare students to critique and evaluate museum practice.

By the end of class you should understand the historical origins of museums, how museums are organized, fundamentals of collection care and curation, how exhibits are conceptualized and created, and issues facing anthropological museums and museums in general, particularly related to the repatriation of cultural heritage in international settings and within the United States.

Class participation, attendance, and discussion are critical to your success in the class. Come prepared to discuss the readings.

We will visit campus facilities and museums and meet with museum specialists.
